Nourishment is defined as food needed for growth, health and sustenance. At New York Common Pantry (NYCP), we understand the importance of this basic need and we embrace our role in fulfilling it for New Yorkers every day. Despite the return to normalcy for some of us, many of our neighbors still struggle with the high cost of food, low wages, and cuts to pandemic-era benefits that helped lift children and families out of poverty. Our case managers and dedicated staff are a beacon of hope to those in need, bringing nourishment in many ways.

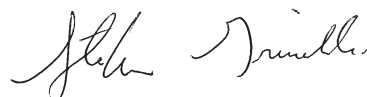
We start by providing food to meet immediate needs and then offer so much more. Many in our community face the harsh realities of running out of money before the end of the month, being unable to pay for medical care or having their utilities shut off. Our team tackles these challenges daily, finding resources to assist with our guests' financial burdens. We've seen a rise in the number of working families we serve, and a significant influx of new arrivals has increased our caseload nearly 21 percent, with needs that fluctuate frequently.

This year has been unprecedented, and NYCP has swiftly adapted to meet the challenges. Our dedicated staff worked tirelessly to optimize programs and secure new resources. The team created healthy, nutritionally-balanced “no cook” Pantry bags for those in shelters without kitchen facilities, expanded our Hot Meals service to address the 20 percent

increase in guests, and broadened the reach of our Live Healthy! nutrition education programs to empower more New Yorkers to lead healthier lives. We support everyone who comes to our doors for assistance. We never turn anyone away.

We target our efforts into reaching the boroughs and communities with the highest poverty rates and which lack other social service resources. Our new Food Storage and Distribution Hub increases our ability to store more food, receive large deliveries and drive down unit costs so that we can dispense to more locations quickly and easily.

All of this is possible because of you. We only can help more of our neighbors in need with your leadership, dedication and generosity, year in and year out. Together, we will keep the light of New York Common Pantry burning bright, giving hope and providing nourishment to so many in our city.

Our strategy extends beyond the distribution of nutritious meals, encompassing the provision of essential tools and resources that empower individuals to achieve lasting stability.



By seamlessly blending direct aid with supplemental initiatives, **New York Common Pantry is not just feeding people — we're fortifying communities,** helping residents overcome their challenges, and paving the way for a more secure and hopeful future for themselves and their families.

In 2024, New York Common Pantry accessed 52% more public benefits for our guests, helping more New Yorkers achieve stability.

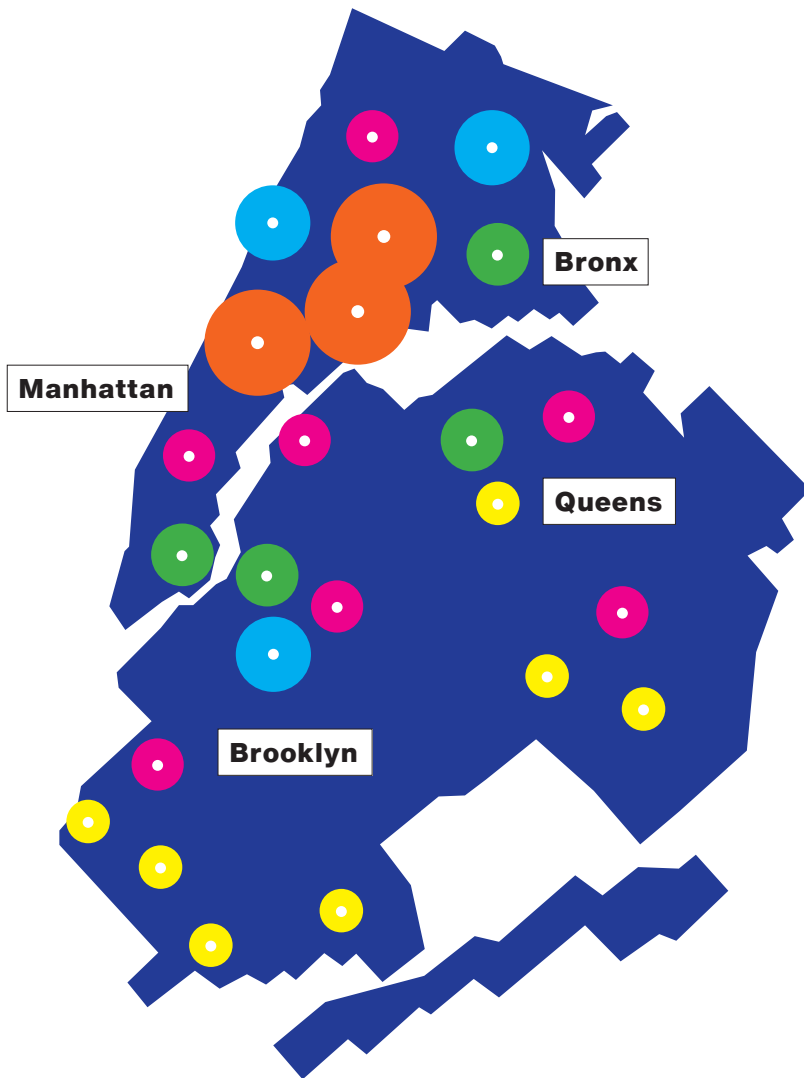

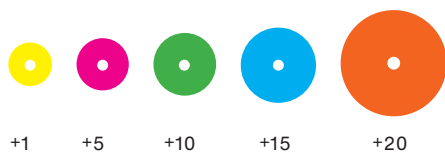
Steven Lallave, NYCP Staff

With a poverty rate of 23%, nearly twice the national average, and 1.8 million NYC residents relying on Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits,¹ the demand for our services keeps growing. New York Common Pantry’s fleet reaches into under-resourced neighborhoods where healthy food and social services are hard to find. We partner with local houses of worship, schools, community centers and housing projects, the trusted pillars of these communities, to bring food and vital support directly to those most in need.

NYCP goes beyond pantry basics — we offer a diverse range of programs that support the whole person. We build strong, trusting relationships with our guests through personalized services delivered by a dedicated team with the expertise to care for each individual with dignity and respect. Many in our community have been turned away elsewhere, but New York Common Pantry welcomes everyone who comes to our doors. Our case managers listen with compassion, offering help and hope. While not every guest qualifies for benefits, our team has created partnerships with other organizations to expand the safety net and ensure no one is left without support. Guests leave NYCP with hope and resources to support their families.



Mark Fuhry, NYCP Guest

Mark Fuhry grew up with addict parents and the family struggled with food insecurity. After college he secured a six-figure NYC property manager job and began using drugs. Mark also contracted HIV and entered an abusive relationship. Ultimately Mark ended up unemployed, homeless, and alone. Two years ago, he started receiving assistance from NYCP's Help 365 and Project Dignity. Now he's sober, healthy, runs daily and eats meals at New York Common Pantry. "I have my own apartment now and come for Choice Pantry. I dream of going to law school to help others. With NYCP's help, I'm taking it one day at a time."

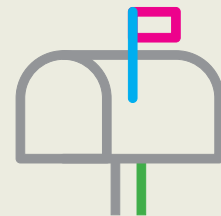
Many of our guests first connect with us through our Hot Meals or Brown Bag Meals To Go programs. Some are unhoused, living in shelters or on the streets, while others, struggling to keep up with bills, find themselves frequently short on food. It is a relief to discover a place where everyone is welcome.



2 HYGIENE SERVICES

Keeping oneself clean is the foundation of dignity and respect. NYCP provides a safe place for guests to wash away the week's worries, grit and grime and get a fresh start.

Guests at New York Common Pantry who live in shelters or are unhoused can take advantage of our hygiene services. Whether it is taking a shower, washing their clothes or getting a haircut, they leave feeling refreshed and ready to face the day.



3 MAIL SERVICE & IDENTIFICATION

A mailing address and ID are critical to the ability to apply for jobs, register to vote, and to receive official documents. NYCP reduces this challenge to daily living by providing mail service and help securing government IDs.

NYCP assists guests with the submission of the paperwork to obtain government IDs and provides a safe, secure place to collect vital benefits documents and personal correspondence. This provides our guests with an essential foothold to stability and autonomy.

4 BENEFITS & HOUSING HELP

Many New Yorkers lack consistent access to basic necessities like food, clothing, housing, medical care, and social services. NYCP is here to help.

Access to public benefits is crucial for many guests to secure shelter, healthcare and food. NYCP case managers work closely with each individual to assess their needs, identify resources and provide support with expenses, offering a pathway to greater self-sufficiency.



5 FOOD SECURITY & NUTRITION

When guests visit NYCP, they receive nutritious, high-quality food, carefully chosen to support their health and well-being.

NYCP's Choice Pantry, Mobile, Farm Share, and Nourish (for seniors) programs ensure that guests receive nutritious, culturally-relevant food. Through our nutrition education programs, participants learn about the nutritional value of foods, how to shop on a budget, and how to prepare the healthy foods we provide — all of which enables them to better support their families.

NYCP's goal is increased stability, wellness, and agency for every guest we serve.

Shawn has worked at NYCP for nine years, providing a range of services for unhoused guests including counseling, securing key documents, and housing assistance. He taps his partnership network to broaden the resources for his guests. The work demands adherence to processes and schedules, which guests can find challenging. Shawn approaches each guest from a place of understanding and meets them in the middle. Every day is different, and his excitement comes from successfully finding housing for his clients.

“One thing I’ve learned is to not judge anybody. Listen to folks, don’t even interrupt them, and let them get what they need to get off their chest. They’re so used to being told no.”

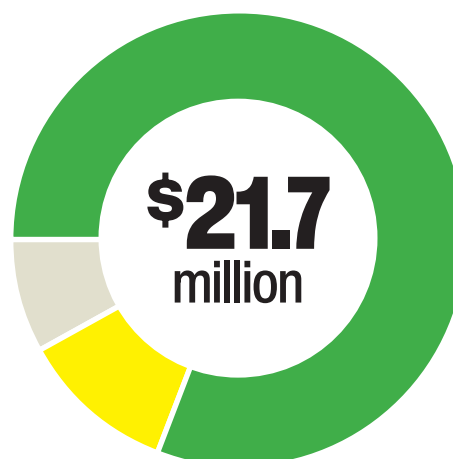

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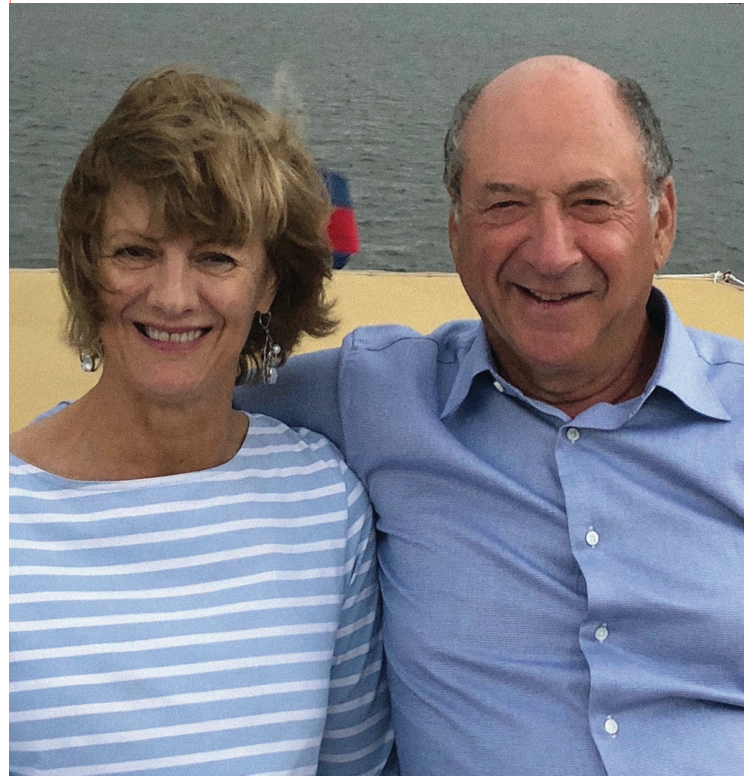
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In Memory of Paul Holt, NYCP Supporter
